

Resumption of public Masses slated for weekend of May 23-24 with social distancing guidelines in effect

Dear Sisters and Brothers in our Risen Lord,


Jesus Christ is Risen. He is Risen indeed!

I have been touched by your love for the Eucharist and the Easter Sacraments and your support of your parish and our priests. I am also grateful for your patience over the past weeks. I believe the Holy Spirit has been creating within us a hunger for the Eucharist.

I write to you today with the news that we will start public Masses, without obligation and complying with the requirements of social distancing. Our priests have received my decree "RETURNING TO WORSHIP TOGETHER" for the opening of churches May 23 and 24.

Your pastors have been working hard to prepare our moment churches in order for us to come together again as a community of faith. I encourage you to work with your pastor in creating a safe environment for all as we come back together as community. Protecting each other from the Coronavirus remains of utmost importance. We must keep in mind that opening the churches for the public celebration of Mass does not signal the 'end' of this contagious pandemic. Everyone's vigilance in regard to proper distancing, hygiene, and other measures is crucial whenever we gather.

As we come back together as a community of faith, let us work in unity for the good of everyone. Bear in mind the urging of St. Paul to the Church in Philippi: "Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind



regard one another as more important than yourselves; do not merely look out for your own personal interests, but also for the interests of others. Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus..." Philippians 2:3-5. Let us take care of one another.

While the Sunday obligation to participate in Mass continues to be dispensed for the faithful, it is important that we have the opportunity to come together as community and celebrate God's

CATHOLIC DIOCESE OF BILOXI INITIAL STEPS FOR RETURNING TO WORSHIP TOGETHER

Below is a list of things that should be done/prepared for before we can welcome parishioners back to our churches.

PREPARATION

† Bishop Kihneman will continue to dispense the faithful from the obligation to participate in Holy Mass, and anyone who is ill will be asked to stay home in charity to others.

† Vulnerable individuals, those 65 and older or with underlying health conditions, should continue to shelter in place. Families with vulnerable individuals are encouraged to continue to take special precautions.

Hand sanitizer should be provided at church entrances and at other appropriate places in the church (e.g., at the credence table, the Priest Celebrant's chair, restrooms) and other parish buildings.

₱ Masks for clergy, ushers, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, Altar Servers, and extra for parishioners should be provided. (Can be ordered through Sun Coast Supply, (228) 868-2522.)

Pews and the floor where the communion line forms should be marked with six-feet spacing

† Pews, including tops, seats and kneelers, are to be sanitized be available, contact Terry Dickson before all Masses as well as all touch surfaces.
